# Celebrating Successes : Transitioning : Facing New Challenges

The pastoral days of May through June 2022 help us anticipate summer vacations, family times, and relaxation. However, we in AAUW have seen them bring us many changes and challenges both the uplifting and the extremely trying; as a Branch, a Pennsylvania statewide organization, and a National entity, *and* as individuals.

The Harrisburg Branch installed the 2022-2023 Executive Committee. AAUW-PA installed a new President and Program Vice President. AAUW National promoted *Bans Off Our Bodies* rallies being held by Planned Parenthood nationwide on May 14. But, as of June 24, 2022, the US Supreme Court sent the issue back to individual states by reversing Roe v. Wade, even as U.S. Soccer announced landmark new contracts that will include the squads (USWNT & USMNT) equally in pay situations as well as equalize the parental benefits and even the types of field surfaces used! And, as of June 28, SCOTUS has put on hold arguments challenging redistricting of 2 states prior to midterm elections (specifically Louisiana and Alabama). Fair Districts PA, one of our partners, has fought long and hard for a fair redistricting map, which has come to a current version by PA Supreme Court Order as of March 16, 2022. Can this be challenged?

Are we seeing the stirrings of many firestorms across a broad spectrum of issues that potentially radically change the lives of all people, not just women?

Rather than easing into summer, and life, post-Covid, it would seem that we as individuals and groups need to perk up our ears and investigate issues in a broad spectrum of areas.



After four years serving as our AAUW-PA President, Ann Pehle gave her official farewell thoughts and passed the gavel to Cindy Hall of the State College Branch at the 2022 AAUW-PA Convention in early June.

The **Beverly J. Smith Memorial Scholarship** (\$2,500) will be awarded to a female resident of Dauphin, Cumberland, or Perry County who attends an accredited college or university in Pennsylvania *in pursuit of a bachelor's degree*. Requirements include *completion of 60 credits*, a minimum 3.40 GPA, demonstration of financial need, and <u>enrollment as a full-time student for the 2022-2023 academic year.</u>

The **Member Memorial Scholarship** (\$1,500) will be awarded to a female resident of Dauphin, Cumberland, or Perry County who attends an accredited college or university in Pennsylvania *in pursuit of an associate or bachelor's degree*. Requirements include *completion of 15 credits*, minimum 3.00 GPA, demonstration of financial need, and <u>enrollment on at least a half-time basis (6 credits per term) for the 2022-2023 academic year.</u>

The **Ronald D. and Kathleen A. Krausse STEM Scholarship** (\$1,500) will be awarded to a female resident of Dauphin, Cumberland, or Perry County who attends an accredited college or university in Pennsylvania *in pursuit of a bachelor's degree in a STEM major*. Requirements include *completion of 30 credits,* minimum 3.00 GPA, demonstration of financial need, and <u>enrollment as a full-time student in the 2022-2023 academic year</u>.

The **Sally C. Chamberlain Scholarship** (\$1,500) will be awarded to a female resident of Dauphin, Cumberland, or Perry County who is seeking to *resume or renew academic work*. Requirements include *completion of 15 credits toward an associate or bachelor's degree*, a minimum 2.9 GPA, demonstration of financial need, and <u>enrollment on at least a half-time basis (6 credits per term)</u> at a college or university in Pennsylvania for the 2022-2023 academic year.

All applications must be postmarked or time-stamped (if submitted electronically) by July 15, 2022



From a renowned political scientist and transgender rights advocate—a new work that "will change the way we think, talk about and work for transgender policy and justice."


This July, join professor and author Paisley Currah for an in-person and livestream discussion on his new book, *Sex is as Sex Does: Governing Transgen*-

# National AAUW Opportunities and Updates

#### What Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization Means for Reproductive Rights



"AAUW strongly condemns the U.S. Supreme Court's decision in Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization. The decision overturns the landmark Roe v. Wade ruling that established abortion as a constitutionally protected right nearly 50 years ago. It also ignores the will of the American people, 80% of whom support legal abortion.

AAUW believes everyone has the right to make decisions about their own reproductive lives without government interference. Abortion access is vital to women's

ability to control their lives, bodies and futures. Without reproductive freedom, there can be no equity. Being able to choose whether and when to become a parent improves women's well-being and fosters economic security—a crucial component of AAUW's mission. This is particularly important in a country that lacks accessible maternal health care, paid caregiving leave and workplace protections for pregnant workers.

The Court's decision hurts all of us, but it will do the most harm to low-income people, women of color, immigrants, people with disabilities and LGBTQ+ people, because these groups already face substantial barriers to accessing reproductive services and health care.

While the Court's decision is a major setback for all Americans, AAUW remains steadfast in our commitment to protecting reproductive rights, a vital component of gender equity. "

Without the protections provided by Roe, states now have broad leeway to legislate away basic reproductive rights. In the first half of 2022 alone, 12 states have enacted restrictions on abortion care and another 14 are expected to follow shortly. But it's not all dire—11 states have countered with their own laws to strengthen and expand abortion rights.

Policy staff are listening closely to the top voices in the reproductive rights and health space while tracking the fallout from the Dobbs decision. As this summer unfolds, we will keep you up to date on grassroots advocacy opportunities and election-related activities. Just this morning, the White House announced the signing of an executive order to protect reproductive rights. It is an important first step, but there is more work to be done.




