## "The Patriot Daughters of Lancaster Present..."

Civilian reenactors will share documented stories of the Patriot Daughters of Lancaster, which was a ladies' aid society formed ten days after the firing on Ft. Sumter on April 12 1861.

To help us appreciate the enormity of what these women undertook, the Patriot Daughters of Lancaster have provided us with a brief background of their organization.

The Patriot Daughters
of Lancaster & Associates

1861 - 1865

During the Civil War numerous societies, often referred to as "ladies' aid societies," were formed in the North by civilians wishing to support the troops and contribute to the war effort. On April 22, 1861 -- just ten days after the firing on Fort Sumter-- a group of ladies met at the Lancaster Court House to organize the Patriot Daughters of Lancaster. Rosina Hubley, owner of the Swan Tav-

ern and Hotel, was elected president and continued in that position for th duration of the war.

The initial purpose of the organiza-



tion was to provide money, food and supplies for soldiers serving in local companies of Pennsylvania Regiments. They organized the sewing for needed articles of clothing and made bandages for hospitals. The Patriot Daughters provided soldiers from Lancaster with supplies as they left for the war and welcomed them home with elaborate dinners after they had been mustered out of the service. They also provided national flags to Lancaster companies. Wagons loaded with provisions were driven to sites where there had been major battles by Lancaster men acting as agents for the Patriot Daughters.

The Patriot Daughters formed various committees, including the Ward Committee, made up of women going door-to-door in their respective wards to collect needed items. Other committees were identified as Purchases, Repository, and Packing. Meetings were held in St. James Episcopal Church School Room. The Patriot Daughters opened and managed an infirmary for ill soldiers. In addition, they collected money for widows and children and provided for children whose fathers had gone to war.

In the book, Hospital Scenes After the Battle of Gettysburg, the Patriot Daughters described their experiences nursing soldiers at Christ Lutheran Church in Gettysburg during July of 1863. They remained there for four weeks, nursing and cooking for the soldiers. Later, they

were asked to return to Gettysburg to care for wounded with the Sisters of Charity at the Lutheran Seminary hospital.

The Patriot Daughters held sanitary fairs and bazaars to raise money. One huge event, "A Soldiers Fair," was held in February 1864 at Fulton Hall, now the Fulton Theater, with proceeds totaling \$12,000 (over



\$270,000 in 2022 dollars). The week-long fair included displays of relics of the war, items from the Battle of Gettysburg, ladies' handwork, fine art, concerts and tableaux, refreshments, and items for sale.

Their effect on the soldiers in the field was profound. In a letter from Harrison's Landing, VA, Captain William L. Bear of Company B, 1st Pennsylvania Reserves wrote,

"Could the Patriot Daughters of Lancaster have but seen the countenances and hear the grateful expressions which fell from the lips of the survivors of the bloody conflicts before Richmond, they would have been in some measure repaid for their generous offering."

After the formal organization was disbanded in 1865, its members continued to support widows and orphans and helped to educate freed slaves. Patriot Daughters



spearheaded fundraising for Lancaster's Soldiers' and Sailors' Monument erected in Penn Square in 1874.

We remember and honor the dedicated service of those civilians of Lancaster by portraying the Patriot Daughters at local living history events and Civil War reenactments. Join the Civil War living historians, men & women, in portraying the Patriot Daughters of Lancaster, the teamsters, and the soldiers they served.





She was fascinated by Catherine the Great. Catherine was a self-declared "defender of the arts and sciences" and credited with modernizing Russia. Next summer marks the 160th anniversary of the Battle of Gettysburg. In July of 1863, borough townswomen showed their mettle by risking their lives to nurse the wounded, turning churches and schools into makeshift hospitals, provisioning food and supplies, and administering medicines. Other women defied social norms by fighting as soldiers on the battlefield.

Today AAUW Women are continuing to fight together on the Front Line for pay equity, women's comprehensive healthcare, legislative representation, Title IX education equity, fair voting practices, and legislating against abuse, violence, and persistent gender, gender-identity, and racial bias.

As noted, the bylaw changes proposed this year are designed to bring AAUW's bylaws more in line with current governance practices and principles related to board operations and the structure of bylaws. The board recognizes that the membership requirement is an issue that many members feel passionately about and believes that requirement deserves a separate vote at another time, uncomplicated by other more technical bylaw changes to update AAUW governance practices.


