## Insight Into Our Winter Presenters

### Connie Doebele

Connie Doebele spent 25 years as a senior executive producer and on-air interviewer for C-SPAN television. After

many years interviewing politicians, she was asked to head up a new division featuring non-fiction books called Book TV, which is now in its 25th year.

From 2017 to 2021, Connie was at the helm of The Center for C-SPAN Scholarship & Engagement (CCSE) as CCSE's first Managing Director. Based at Purdue University, CCSE is a

national research center focused on discovery, learning, and engagement utilizing the C-SPAN Video Library. Connie was instrumental in establishing many of its signature programs including the CCSE Internships, Undergraduate Research Competition, and the CCSE Student Community. Besides creating the internships with C-SPAN, she facilitated many incredible opportunities for students including visiting historic presidential sites as well as connecting students with nationally known guest speakers.

Newly retired in Harrisburg, she continues her focus on books as a member of the Board of Trustees of the Dauphin County Library. Connie enjoys leading discussions about the power of books in our lives. Every person has a different

relationship with reading. And it can change during different parts of their lives. What influenced you at an early age? Come with thoughts about books that changed your life, places that have influenced your reading, and authors who make reading enjoyable to you.





## True Women Influencers Don't Need TikTok to Make the Difference

#### From Mantel to Museum: the Eclectic Legacy of Patricia L. Murray

During her lifetime, Patricia L. Murray served as one of the founders of the Susquehanna Art Museum (SAM), a donor to the institution, an educator, and a private art collector. Just recently, in 2023, parts of her collection were donated to SAM posthumously, highlighting her dedication to the museum before, during, and after its creation.

From Mantel to Museum: The Eclectic Legacy of Patricia L. Murray showcases an eclectic mix of artistic styles, form, and thematic content by local and regional artists: F.L. Wall, Joan Danziger, Leon Berkowitz, Douglas Zucco, Theo Tobiasse, and Ellen Siddons. Subsequently, it invites viewers to recognize Murray as an overtly positive force in the history of SAM and the greater Harrisburg art world.

Rosalynn Carter

our First Lady alongside 39th President Jimmy Carter from from 1977 to 1981, passed away aged 96, Sunday, November 19, 2023. She was a passionate life long cham-




pion of mental health, caregiving, and

women's rights, and was a great humanitarian in her own right. Though soft-spoken, she was nevertheless politically astitute and assertive, lobbying vigorously for the Equal Rights Amendment and for women to participate at all levels of government. In private life, Rosalynn and Jimmy embarked on what would be the longest, most active post-presidency in American history. They traveled the world in support of human rights, democracy and health programs. Domestically, they labored in service to others.

#### Sandra Day O'Connor

passed away on December 1, 2023, at the age of 93. Although William H. Rehnquist, her Stanford Law School classmate, served as chief justice during much of her tenure from 1981 until 2006, the Supreme Court during that crucial period was often called the O'Connor court, and Justice O'Connor was referred to, accurately, as the most powerful woman in America.



Very little could happen without Justice O'Connor's support when it came to the polarizing issues on the court's docket, and the law regarding affirmative action, abortion, voting rights, religion, federalism, sex discrimination and other hot-button subjects That the middle ground she looked for tended to be the public's preferred place as well was no coincidence, given the close attention Justice O'Connor paid to current events and the public mood.

There is legislation moving through the Pennsylvania House right now

that could make paid family leave a reality in PA - tell your state legislator to support it. The bipartisan-supported **Family Care Act (HB181)** passed through the PA House Labor & Industry Committee and is poised to come to the floor for a full House vote.

HB181 recognizes something we already know to be true: family takes care of family. By establishing a paid family medical leave program in Pennsylvania, the Family Care Act would allow:

- parents to be there for their newborn following birth or care for their child during an illness
- family members to provide critical care for elderly loved ones
- workers to care for themselves following a major surgery

## December 13, 2023 - "historic" bump in expanded PA Child and Dependent Care tax credit.

Governor Shapiro signed into law major expansion of child and dependent care tax credit which expands the Child Care Tax Credit for over 200,000 Pennsylvania families. The new rules allow individuals to claim 100% of the federal credit they claimed. That's up to \$3,000 for a single dependent and \$6,000 for two or more. The "historic" bump means one-child families will receive a credit worth as much as \$1,200, while those with multiple children could receive as much as \$2,100.













