today. Beginning in 2003,
her position at Penn State
received a new title: Di-

rector of Multicultural Recruitment and Community Affairs. She worked extensively to establish links and partnerships with community organizations, with an emphasis on providing increased access to higher education for underrepresented groups, including students of color, first generation college goers, and low income students. The fostering of a more inclusive environment as well as innovative programs from the 6th through the 12th grades count among her achievements. The longtime literacy advocate has also chaired Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Epsilon Sigma Theta Chapter's African American Read-In.

As active, lifelong members of the two major African American sororities, *Zeta Phi Beta* and *Alpha Kappa Alpha*, our speakers will address gaps in women's history by focusing on Black sororities, their key role historically and in the Harrisburg community today. You may recall how Kamala Harris, in her speech at the 2020 Democratic National convention saluted specific women who inspired her to "pick up the torch and fight on." Almost all of these women belonged to Black sororities. As Harris noted, "Family is my beloved Alpha Kappa Alpha." Katina Moten and Barbara Thompson demonstrate in their life's work a commitment to strengthening equity, opportunity, and the quality of our educational systems. Katina and Barbara will address the roles that Black sororities play in their own lives and in our community at large.

Zeta Phi Beta Sorority, Incorporated, was founded in 1920, at Howard University, Washington, D.C., envisioning a sorority that would directly affect positive change, chart a course of action for the 1920s and beyond, raise people's conscious-

ness to address fully the societal mores, ills, prejudices, and poverty affecting humanity in general and the black community in particular, encourage the highest standards of scholastic achievement, and foster a unity among its members.

Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc.(AKA), is an international service organization founded in 1908 at Howard Univerity, becoming the first

intercollegiate historically African American sorority. These women began a mission to cultivate and encourage high scholastic and ethical standards; promote unity and friendship among college women; study and help alleviate problems concerning girls and women in order to improve their social stature, and to be of "Service to All Mankind."





# The AAUW Board of Directors and Governance Committee recommend approval of the following Bylaw Amendment to eliminate the degree requirement for membership in AAUW

# **Amendment Summary**

## THE PROPOSED REVISION OF ARTICLE III of the WOULD:

Replace the Individual Members paragraph of the Membership Qualification provision (currently Article III Section 2 a) with new language indicating the sole requirement for membership is support of AAUW's purpose.

Delete the provision on Student Associates (currently Section 3) since students would be allowed to join as full members of AAUW thus eliminating the need for a Student Associate provision.

Renumber Section 4 Dues as Section 3 and delete the reference to "categories of membership" in this section to permit the board to set different dues for student members as previously allowed when Student Associates were listed as a separate category rather than included as part of the Individual Membership category.

Make no changes to Article III Section 1 or Sections 5 and 6 on Life Membership and Membership Decisions, except that Section 5 Membership Decisions, and Section 6 Affiliates would be renumbered as Sections 4 and 5, respectively, with no other change.

The AAUW Board of Directors and Governance Committee recommend approval of the following bylaw amendment to eliminate the degree requirement for membership in AAUW. This change will align our membership practices with our purpose of advancing equity for women and girls and enable us to include members with the diverse backgrounds and perspectives needed to achieve our purpose in today's world.

We remain committed to higher education as a pathway to eliminate barriers that hold women back and to enhance their leadership opportunities at all levels. We admire the effort of the inspiring women who have led the way in earning their degrees. We recognize, however, that in today's world higher education degrees are one of several paths needed to advance equity for women and girls. Professional certifications, on the job training, career technical experience and life experience all are alternative paths to obtaining education and the skills needed to become leaders and advocates for ending discrimination against women.

When AAUW began its work, higher education and professional careers were denied to most women. That is no longer the case. More than 50% of college degrees are currently being awarded to women, and women are now attaining powerful positions in business and government. Yet discrimination against women continues. Eliminating the degree requirement enables us to expand our voice and our reach, our ability to fulfill our purpose, and will open more opportunities to address the needs of all women.

AAUW's name, which continues to have significant brand recognition for AAUW as a women's rights organization, will remain the same if the amendment is adopted.





On Thursday, January 11th, Pennsylvania's Basic Education **Funding Commission (BEFC)** 

approved a detailed and comprehensive report with recommendations that, if implemented, would bring transformational change to Pennsylvania's school

funding system and have a life-changing impact on public school students.

The BEFC report demonstrates a new recognition in Harrisburg that the state has a constitutional responsibility to provide adequate and equitable funding for public education to meet students' needs.

Report Highlights and Details

The BEFC made the following recommendations to the Governor, General Assembly, and State Board of Education on page 2 of the report:

- 1. Reduce the volatility in the basic education funding (BEF) formula by using three-year averages in certain data elements, lessening the concentrated poverty "cliff," and resetting the base at the 2023/24 distribution level. Provide at least a \$200 million increase through this updated BEF formula each year that would be shared among all 500 school districts
- 2. Calculate adequacy targets for each school district
- 3. Reconstitute the next BEFC in 2029 per Act 51 of 2014
- 4. Invest in school facilities
- 5. Examine charter school funding
- 6.Invest in our education workforce
- 7. Invest in student supports
- 8. Consider other important education issues outside the direct scope of this BEFC

Each year, this symbolic day is used to raise awareness around and combat the impact of pay inequities. Equal Pay Day 2024 marks the current state of the gender pay gap for women: 84% for full-time, year-round workers and 78% for all workers (including part-time and seasonal).




