Alice Kahler Marshall (1923-97), a Harrisburg-area journalist, magazine editor, speech writer, researcher, compiler; collected materials on women's history non-stop from when she started collecting items that piqued her interest while she was a student at George Washington University and continuing for over 50 years. Her interest stemmed from her fascination with the contradictions between the realities of women's lives and the stereotypes of women's behavior.

She donated her mammoth collection, originally housed in her home - while also raising four children - to Penn State Harrisburg in 1991. It is one of the largest, privately compiled

history and encompassing the day-to-day challenges and triumphs of women's lives. The result includes literary, graphic, and manuscript materials from the 15th century to the





is the vast array of materials that illuminate the history of woman suffrage in America.

Driving Directions to Penn State Harrisburg: Follow Route 283 toward the Harrisburg International Airport. Take the Harrisburg International Airport exit. Continue to follow signs for the Airport and the college. Before entering the Airport complex, take the exit for Route 230 (West Harrisburg Pike). Turn left at the traffic light and proceed along Route 230 East approximately one mile. Turn left at First Street to enter the campus. Turn right onto Olmsted Drive. Proceed on Olmsted Drive to the Library and Olmsted parking lots.



Parking Directions: SEE THE ATTACHED CAMPUS MAP on page 3, download the link, or put the street address from page 1 in your GPS to locate the Library lot and the Olmsted Drive lot. Handicapped spots are at the top of Library lot, closest to the Library. The campus map also shows additional parking areas, if needed.

The Campus Police will not enforce parking permits in the Library lot and the Olmsted Drive lot from 1:30 to 4:30pm on April 18th. *If there is an instance where a guest parks outside this area for this event and gets a violation, please let Carol Nechemias know.*

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

Peggy Grove is an entreprenaur, a science and math teacher as well as a tolerance teacher, a community activist, a suffragette, philanthropist, and Vice Chair of the Pennsylvania Democratc Party. She founded the Academy of Medical Arts and Business in 1980 in a flood ravaged building at Third and Boas Streets, which at the time was in a dicey neighborhood. The Academy was a dream which she started with \$500, a desk made of a door atop 2 cinder blocks, and a manual typewriter. The use of the building



was rent free for the first year courtesy of owner Ollie Rosenberg. Her second business was to buy several small apartment buildings with Ollie, rehab them, and lease them in the affordable housing market. In 1979, along with starting the Academy, she ran for and won a seat on the Mechanicsburg School Board and subsequently was appointed to the Cumberland Perry Vo-Tech Board. Through recommendation of Linda Robertson, Peggy concurrently became part of the Pennsylvania Commission for Women. Over the past 20 years, she has established many scholarships for area schools as well as for Reno NV High School, her alma mater. Presently, through connections with fellow Rotarians, she brought together three transitional housing programs for homeless military veterans on 20 acres of vacant land that she owns south of the PennDOT building in Harrisburg - to BOPA she has donated 5 acres to be dedicated on May 29, 2024; to Tunnels2Towers - the use of 8.5 acres (in progress); and to Eden Village, 6.5 acres' use. 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Announcing Scholarships Available for the 2024 - 2025 Academic Year

The American Association of University Women, Harrisburg Branch,

announces five college scholarships available to women in the Central Pennsylvania region who are pursuing degrees in the 2024-2025 academic year.

The Beverly J. Smith Memorial Scholarship (\$2,500) will be awarded to a female resident of Cumberland, Dauphin, Perry County, or Northern York School District who attends an accredited college or university in Pennsylvania in pursuit of a bachelor's degree. Requirements include completion of 60 credits, a minimum 3.40 GPA, demonstration of financial need, and enrollment as a full-time student for the 2024-2025 academic year.

The Member Memorial Scholarship (\$1,500) will be awarded to a female resident of Cumberland, Dauphin, Perry County, or Northern York School District who attends an accredited college or university in Pennsylvania in pursuit of an associate or bachelor's degree. Requirements include completion of 15 credits, minimum 3.00 GPA, demonstration of financial need, and enrollment on at least a half-time basis (6 credits per term) for the 2024-2025 academic year.

The Ronald D. and Kathleen A. Krausse STEM Scholarship (\$1,500) will be awarded to a female resident of Cumberland, Dauphin, Perry County, or Northern York School District who attends an accredited college or university in Pennsylvania in pursuit of a bachelor's degree in a STEM major. Requirements include completion of 30 credits, minimum 3.00 GPA, demonstration of financial need, and enrollment as a full-time student in the 2024-2025 academic year.

The Sally C. Chamberlain Scholarship (\$1,500) will be awarded to a female resident of Cumberland, Dauphin, Perry County, or Northern York School District who is seeking to resume or renew academic work for credit towards career employment or advancement, for example, those who have experienced interruptions in their post-secondary education and want to resume their studies. Requirements include completion of 15 credits toward an associate or bachelor's degree, a minimum 2.9 GPA, demonstration of financial need, and enrollment on at least a half-time basis (6 credits per term) at a college or university in Pennsylvania for the 2024-2025 academic year.

The Monique and Ernie Guenin Memorial Scholarship (\$1,500) will be awarded to a female resident of Lebanon County who attends an accredited college or university in Pennsylvania in pursuit of a bachelor's degree in a STEM major. Requirements include completion of 30 credits, minimum 3.00 GPA, demonstration of financial need, and enrollment as a full-time student in the 2024-2025 academic year.

School Boards: The Battleground for the Education Culture Wars - Happening Locally and Deserving Our Attention



Across the country, we have seen school boards, and candidates for school boards, taking up controversial policies that have led to banning books from school libraries; the censorship of curriculum in school classrooms due to individuals finding content "objectionable"; and policies leading to

the prevention of safe school climates for students of all sexual orientations and gender identities.





The AAUW Board of Directors and Governance Committee recommend approval of the following Bylaw Amendment to eliminate the degree requirement for membership in AAUW

Amendment Summary

THE PROPOSED REVISION OF ARTICLE III of the WOULD:

Replace the Individual Members paragraph of the Membership Qualification provision (currently Article III Section 2 a) with new language indicating the sole requirement for membership is support of AAUW's purpose.

Delete the provision on Student Associates (currently Section 3) since students would be allowed to join as full members of AAUW thus eliminating the need for a Student Associate provision.

Renumber Section 4 Dues as Section 3 and delete the reference to "categories of membership" in this section to permit the board to set different dues for student members as previously allowed when Student Associates were listed as a separate category rather than included as part of the Individual Membership category.

Make no changes to Article III Section 1 or Sections 5 and 6 on Life Membership and Membership Decisions, except that Section 5 Membership Decisions, and Section 6 Affiliates would be renumbered as Sections 4 and 5, respectively, with no other change.

The AAUW Board of Directors and Governance Committee recommend approval of the following bylaw amendment to eliminate the degree requirement for membership in AAUW. This change will align our membership practices with our purpose of advancing equity for women and girls and enable us to include members with the diverse backgrounds and perspectives needed to achieve our purpose in today's world.

We remain committed to higher education as a pathway to eliminate barriers that hold women back and to enhance their leadership opportunities at all levels. We admire the effort of the inspiring women who have led the way in earning their degrees. We recognize, however, that in today's world higher education degrees are one of several paths needed to advance equity for women and girls. Professional certifications, on the job training, career technical experience and life experience all are alternative paths to obtaining education and the skills needed to become leaders and advocates for ending discrimination against women.

When AAUW began its work, higher education and professional careers were denied to most women. That is no longer the case. More than 50% of college degrees are currently being awarded to women, and women are now attaining powerful positions in business and government. Yet discrimination against women continues. Eliminating the degree requirement enables us to expand our voice and our reach, our ability to fulfill our purpose, and will open more opportunities to address the needs of all women.

AAUW's name, which continues to have significant brand recognition for AAUW as a women's rights organization, will remain the same if the amendment is adopted.
