A Bit About Bobbi -

Local folksinger-songwriter Bobbi Carmitchell, familiar to many of us, will entertain, engage, and enlighten with songs from the Women's Movement and perhaps a few seasonal tunes. Bobbi Carmitchell has played an active role in the women's community of Central PA for over 45 years. Starting out in 1980, Bobbi was a mem-



ber of the popular musical trio Wind and Wood, which had the honor of being the area's first all women musical group. They quickly developed a large, loyal following which still to this day has deep roots in local social activism.

In the late 80's, Bobbi set out on a successful solo career, and toured extensively throughout the United States and Canada up until the early 2000's. With 7 recordings to her credit, her songwriting has been chosen for many compilations and has received airplay on countless occasions.

Around that time, Bobbi became interested in a different kind of writing, historical fiction, and is currently in the early draft stages of her first novel, The Swim Lesson. Through her extensive research for her book, she has uncovered many stories and songs of the early Feminist pioneers and is passionate about sharing what she has learned with anyone who will listen!





And a Functional Request from the Board


It was decided at our November Board meeting to develop an Advocacy Bag.

Securing the Future: A Post-Election Conversation on Women's Economic Security

On November 19, 2024, AAUW sponsored a webinar on the path forward for women's economic security under the incoming Trump administration and the 119th Congress.

As the nation navigates a new political landscape, the webinar explored key issues such as workplace equity, reproductive rights, affordable childcare and paid family leave. Our expert panel discussed policy solutions to address these pressing challenges and analyzed the political outlook for advancing women's overall economic well-being in the coming years.

By the end of the recording, you will understand the impact of the changing political and economic landscape, how they impact your life and how you can build a stronger, more equitable future for women nationwide. Don't miss it!

The United States continues to experience the highest maternity mortality rate in the developed world. The House has passed the bipartisan H.R. 3838 bill! We need the companion - Preventing Maternal Deaths Reauthorization Act of 2023 (S. 2415) to pass in the Senate before January 25, 2025.



According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, most deaths (58%) occur in women aged 25-34, and women aged 40-44 had the highest pregnancy-associated mortality ratio (PAMR). There were about 19 maternal deaths for every 100,000 live births. The CDC, however, estimates that at least 80% of mater-

nal mortalities are preventable. Additionally, persistent disparities exist across key maternal and infant health indicators. Black and Native American women are 62% more likely to give birth prematurely, and their babies have a mortality rate double that of the white population.

The bipartisan Preventing Maternal Deaths Reauthorization Act of 2023 (S. 2415) would reauthorize federal support for

state-based maternal mortality review committees, which review pregnancy-related deaths to identify causes and make recommendations to prevent future mortalities. The legislation would also require the CDC to work with the Health Resources and Services Administration to disseminate best practices to prevent maternal mortality to hospitals and other health care providers. *Please urge your senators and representative to co-sponsor and support the Preventing Maternal Deaths Reauthorization Act of 2023.*





Including the fully ratified ERA in the constitution would be a HUGE step in protecting everyone in this country. We've only got 55 days to make this happen during the current administration. **AAUW Maryland** would like to invite you to view the engaging *90-minute documentary* "Ratified" - December 1, 2024, at 2 pm. This movie shares the story of where we've been on the journey to ratification

M A R Y L A N D of the Equal Rights Amendment and what we need to do moving forward. You'll learn the details of the work accomplished in Virginia, the last state to ratify in 2020. Sign up today for a free Kinema account, and then register to attend the <u>RATIFIED screening for AAUW</u>. The documentary will be followed by a brief panel discussion with Tonja Roberts-Brooks, Co-Founder and Outreach Director of Vote Equality, and Judy Carbone, President, AAUW Garrett, Maryland Branch (who is also a member of the Maryland Commission for Women). The panelists will help clarify the next steps in remaining days of this administration.

This year's theme is bringing awareness for the need for increasing cost and time served for violating

Now in its 57th year, the *Art of the State* exhibition is an annual juried exhibition held at The State Museum of Pennsylvania in cooperation with the Pennsylvania Heritage Foundation. This year's panel of expert jurors reviewed and selected the 96 top-scoring works to be exhibited from more than 2,200 entries submitted by more than 600 artists from 28 counties across the State. It "offers a captivating glimpse into the Commonwealth's rich artistic heritage, featuring works that span painting, photography/digital media, craft, sculpture, and works on paper."

"Art of the State" is scheduled to be open to the public through Sunday, January 5, 2025.


