The State Library of Pennsylvania encourages each and every Pennsylvanian to explore the Library's services and collections. These services and collections reflect the Library's basic mission

 to provide and preserve the stories of Pennsylvania while also providing assistance to the Commonwealth government.

The collections are particularly strong in the fields of public administration, economics, political science, statistics, education, public services, as well as North American, United States and Pennsylvania history. The State Library is the official depository for printed publications of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. That particular collection provides an historical repository of materials of the government of Pennsylvania from the 1700s to the present.

As part of the renovations of the Forum Building, the State Library was closed in January, 2021. The Department of General Services had recognized the need for a comprehensive renovation and modernization of the functionally obsolete Forum Building, which had opened in 1931, while preserving important historical elements such as sculptures, murals, and architectural elements. The \$90 million renovation was launched to modernize the building for the 21st century. The

Library finally reopened its doors in January, 2024.

On this very special afternoon, Kathy Hale, the Supervisor for Public Services and U.S. Government Documents Librarian, and Ellen Shenk, Community Engagement Librarian, will treat AAUW members to a private tour of the refurbished landmark.

This is Kathy Hale's 25th year at the State Library in a variety of positions. She holds an Master of Library Science from PennWest Clarion. Before she came to the State Library, her career as a librarian started at the Middletown Public Library as well as two Central Pennsylvania engineering firms. She has presented sessions at the Federal Depository Library Conference and both the Special Librarians and American Library Associations, has represented the Commonwealth Libraries in conjunction with the Pennsylvania Center for the Book at the National Book Festival in Washington, DC, and is involved as a judge on the state and national levels for National History Day which she

says "gives me hope for the future of students in this country. These students are so smart!"

Beginning her career at the Main Carnegie Library of Pittsburgh in Oakland, Ellen Shenk now serves as the Community Engagement Librarian for the State Library. She holds a Master of Library and Information Science from the University of Pittsburgh. Ellen is a dedicated professional with a strong sense of stewardship for the arts. She is also adamant about appreciation and preservation of our natural resources which she was able to incorporate into her work with

Lilly Ledbetter was a women's equality activist whose fight for pay equity led to passage of the monumental Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act of 2009, which amended the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and allows workers to "obtain relief, including recovery of back pay, for up to two years preceding the filing of the charge."

"Lilly Ledbetter never set out to be a trailblazer or a household name. She just wanted to be paid the same as a man for her hard work," he wrote. "Lilly did what so many Americans before her have done: setting her sights high for herself and even higher for her children and grandchildren."


Culture Vultures Updates: Where We've Been and Where We Are Going






