Former C-SPAN BookTV Senior Executive Producer, who has transplanted herself to the Harrisburg area in her retirement, Connie Doebele will address her career experiences within C -SPAN, highlighting some of the many authors she has interviewed, and giving her perspective as to the uniqueness of this challenging and ultimately

Connie Doebele has always focused her experience choices on her life goal of working in radio and television, earning her Bachelor's degree in Radio and Television, Speech and Theatre at Kansas State University and moving forward to enhance her competence through Film/Cinema/ Video Studies at American University in Washington, D.C. After a short tenure as Press Secretary for Congressman Dan Glickman, she entered into a relationship with C-SPAN that would continue in its various forms throughout the rest of her career until her retirement in 2021.

As the C-SPAN host, she interviewed the full spectrum of those who were influencing the world - from Jimmy Carter, Phyllis Schlafley, author and education activist Jonathan Kozol, and Mark Bowden author of Black Hawk Down, to those giving perspective on contemporary events and people such as Elkan Abramowitz and Robert Morgenthau and others on Judge Sonia Sotomayor, cognitive scientist Steven Pinker - educator and researcher on language and cognition, and John Ibbitson who spoke on Canadian elections (a topic from 2008 that still resonates today). All that she managed to intersperse with creation and ownership of Your Life Story Videos.

The center's objective to facilitate use of the network's expansive online archive of available programming is for scholarly research; to promote its use in the classroom; and to engage with the public and academic community on public affairs issues.

"I guess it's not surprising that my love for that network goes pretty deep. I spent my whole professional career there. The opportunity to take the programs that I and my colleagues worked so hard on and see it have a new life and new possibilities of use for future generations, that opportunity was something that is such an obvious next step for me."

Belle was a black woman who, following the guidance of her mother, passed for white throughout her life becoming one of the most prominent librarians in American history. She ran the Morgan library for forty-three years, building one of the most important collections of rare books and manuscripts in the United States as well as transforming an exclusive private collection into a major public resource, originating the robust program of exhibitions, lectures, publications, and research services that continues today.
